**Action taken report with reference to the Annual Report and the Resolutions
placed at the 219th AGM held on Saturday, 30th September 2023**

I. ACTION TAKEN REPORT

The House was assured at the last AGM that the racks purchased would be put to good use. However, the same remains to be done. The Managing Committee is in the process of revisiting the entire purchase of the racks and the General Body will be informed of the steps taken in due course.

II. COMPLIANCE WITH THE RESOLUTIONS PLACED AT THE PREVIOUS 219TH AGM HELD ON 30TH SEPTEMBER 2023, WHICH WERE PLACED UNDER AGENDA ITEM NO. 8

Proposed Resolutions (From the Managing Committee):

A.1 Resolution No.8. A.1

The resolution No. 8.A.1 moved in the 219th AGM, for confirming the Honorary Fellowships of the Society on 5 distinguished persons, was unanimously passed by the General Body. The function to confer the Society's Honorary Fellowships on them was held on 25th November 2023, the Society's 219th Foundation Day. The names of the Honorary Fellows are given below:

A.2 Resolution No.8.A.2

As per resolution No.8.A.2 of the 219th AGM, pertaining to amendments to Rule 16(a) relating to total meetings attended, and also splitting the said Rule into 3 parts, was passed by the AGM.

The amended Rule 16(a) is given below:

Rule 16(a)

- (i) A Member of the Managing Committee who absents himself/herself for three consecutive meetings of the Managing Committee without leave of absence from the Committee shall automatically cease to be a member of the Managing Committee.
- (ii) All Office bearers and members of the Managing Committee and other office bearers should at least attend 60% of the total meetings held from the end of the AGM **to the date of the Notice of the next AGM**. If any office bearer or member of the Managing Committee fails to attend 60% of the total meetings he/she forfeits his right to remain in that post.
- (iii) **The above attendance rules [16(a)(i) & (ii)] will also be applicable to the Sub-Committee members."**

A.3 Resolution No.8.A.3

As per resolution No.8.A.2 of the 219th AGM, pertaining to amendment to the opening sentence of Rule 8(a) for replacing 31st August with 30th September, was passed by the AGM. **The amended Rule 8(a) is given below:**

Rule 8(a)

On a day not later than **30th September** every year, to be fixed by the Managing Committee, there shall be an Annual General Meeting (AGM) for elections as provided in article 14(a) and for the adoption of the Annual Report of the Managing Committee, which shall contain a statement showing the financial position of the Society, as well as the accounts for the year ended 31st March of the year under audit and the Auditors Report as required by Rule 18, and for the transaction of any other business which the Managing Committee may consider expedient to bring to the notice of the Society. The AGM shall, in alternate years appoint two Statutory Auditors as provided under Rule 18, for the next two years.

A.4 Resolution No.8.A.4

As per resolution No.8.A.4 of the 219th AGM, pertaining to modified charges for reference material / photographs was passed by the House. **The revised charges for reference material / photographs are as under:**

A.6 Resolution No.8.A.6

As per resolution No.8.A.6 of the 219th AGM, the charges for the use of the Durbar Hall to cover the cost of lighting, sound system and staff overtime, was passed by the House. The charges for the use of the Durbar Hall are as under:

President's Message

We are indeed grateful to the Ministry of Culture, Government of India, who have continued to give us an annual grant. Unfortunately, the grant has not been increased for several years, and it has been our constant endeavour to raise this issue with the Ministry.

We are also grateful to the Government of Maharashtra for sanctioning an annual recurring grant of rupees one Crore, which has enabled us to purchase a substantial number of excellent books which have enhanced our already rich collection. We hope that this amount will be released soon.

We have also been interacting ceaselessly with the Municipal Corporation who have been generous in giving their support towards our activities and maintenance.

And now a sad note. The Society suffered a tragic loss when the Chairman of our Board of Trustees, Mr Eknath Kshirsagar, passed away after several months of ill health. He had been a member of the Asiatic Society for many years, and had guided the Society through years of both celebration and tribulation. As a Trustee he provided sound advice on matters of finance and other important issues, while his firm and no-nonsense approach kept us on our toes. The Asiatic Society will miss his clarity of thought and integrity of purpose.

ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR 2023-2024

1. HIGHLIGHTS OF THE YEAR

The efforts made by the Society as noted in the report of 2022-23 bore fruit. A Government of Maharashtra Resolution (GR) dated 8th March 2023 was received stating that Rs.1 Crore Recurring Grant was sanctioned to the Asiatic Society of Mumbai, to be utilized under stipulated heads. While this was welcome news, it was disappointing that the grant is a non-salaried grant and cannot not be utilized for the salary of our staff. Unfortunately, the amount was received in our account as late as 9th January 2024.

It should be noted that 2023-2024 marks the beginning of the 220 years celebrations of the ASM. A Pictorial History of the Asiatic Society of Mumbai is planned and Ms. Shabnam Minwalla has been commissioned to write the book which will be a MARG Publication.

Three talks organized by the Mumbai Research Centre were held in the Durbar Hall as part of the 220 years celebrations, as they celebrated the lives of 3 eminent members of the Society - Bhau Daji Lad, Bhagwanlal Indrajii, and Alexander Burnes:

- (1) Prof. Dr. Rupali Mokashi delivered a talk on "Bhagwanlal Indrajii: Doyen of Indian Epigraphy" on 18th December 2023. The talk was chaired by Prof. Suraj Pandit. This talk was in collaboration with the Directorate of Archaeology and Museums (Government of Maharashtra)
- (2) Dr Arvind Jamkhedkar delivered a talk on Bhau Daji Lad titled "A Multifaceted Personality: A Surgeon and an Indologist" on 8th January 2024. The talk was chaired by Dr. Pheroza Godrej. This talk was held in collaboration with the Directorate of Archaeology and Museums (Government of Maharashtra)
- (3) Prof. Mariam Dossal delivered a talk on "Navigating Rivers, Bridging Cultures: The Extraordinary Life of Sir Alexander Burnes (1805-1841)" on 8th February 2024. The talk was chaired by Dr. Manjiri Kamat.

A three-day non-cooperation agitation was held by the employees of the Society from 3rd to 5th July 2023. It should be noted that, despite the financial constraints faced by the Society, the monthly salaries of the staff are being paid along with the enhanced D.A.

SOCIETY'S FOUNDATION DAY

The 219th Foundation Day was held on 25th November 2023 in the Durbar Hall of the Society. The Chief Guest, H.E. Shri Ramesh Bais, Hon'ble Governor of Maharashtra, and Chief Patron of the Asiatic Society of Mumbai, conferred the Society's Honorary Fellowships on five Renowned Scholars. Mr. Sabyasachi Mukherjee, Director General, CSMVS, delivered the Keynote address.

The Hon'ble Governor also released the latest issue of the ASM Journal Volume 91/2018 of the Society.

The programme was well attended.

Positive response received from the Government of Maharashtra:

During the year, the Asiatic Society, submitted five projects to the Government of Maharashtra, involving a total outlay of around Rs. 17 crores. The five projects are (1) Infrastructure & I.T: Maintenance and Development; (2) Restoration of Maps; (3) Cataloguing & Conservation of Coins; (4) Restoration of Manuscripts; and (5) Restoration of Rare Books. These proposals have, in February 2024, received an encouraging response from the Government. The Managing Committee is in the process of taking matters forward with discussions with the Principal Secretary, Culture Department, as also with other departments.

2. ACTIVITIES OF THE SOCIETY.

- It is heartening that several schools and colleges are arranging visits for their students to visit the Society's premises to view the library and understand the conservation process.
- A special meeting of the Managing Committee was held on 19th April 2023 to discuss the HR policy. The HR expert, Mr. Patwardhan was invited to give his advice. He made many useful suggestions, which are under due consideration of the Managing Committee.
- Dr. Shehernaz Nalwalla, Vice President, was deputed to attend a brain-storming session on "Art Conservation" held on 28th February 2024 at the Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj Vastu Sangrahalaya (CSMVS, Mumbai)
- Dr. Shehernaz Nalwalla, Vice President of the Society, was nominated to attend the meeting of the National Selection Committee (NSC) of the Tagore National Fellowship for Cultural Research (TNFCR) held on 11th March 2024 in the Seminar Room of the Prime Minister's Museum and Library, New Delhi, Chaired by the Secretary, Ministry of Culture, Government of India. Thereafter, Dr. Nalwalla spoke to the Secretary, Ministry of Culture, and others in the Ministry, to press for pending demands for financial assistance and to enhance the Annual Grant of the Asiatic Society of Mumbai.
- In May 2023 Prof. Miles Taylor of Großbritannien-Zentrum Centre for British Studies wrote to the Asiatic Society inviting it to join a project titled "Learned Societies in Colonial India". *As part of the project, the organisers had initiated a three-day International Conference on the topic "In the Cause of Literature and Science: Learned Societies of Modern India" from 03 to 05 November 2023 at the IAS Campus, Shimla.* The Society nominated Prof. Usha R Vijailakshmi to represent the Asiatic Society of Mumbai at the Shimla Conference. She presented a research paper titled "Legacy of the Asiatic Society: Its Relevance as a Preeminent learned Institution of Mumbai", in which she traced the history of the Society and its holdings since its inception. The paper evinced much interest, and the conference organisers have decided to include the paper in the published research volume they intend to bring out.

- Mrs. Kalindi and Mr. Jagdish Matani have donated a valuable book “Golden Book of Tagore” published in 1931 to commemorate Gurudev's Seventieth birthday. The book is priceless as Tagore's handwritten letter dated 29th December 1931 is also attached as a forerunner to this collection.
- The Mumbai Port Authorities celebrated their 150th anniversary by holding their Special Board Meeting on 26th June 2023 in the Durbar Hall of the Society, to repeat what had been done 150 years ago. On this occasion, the Mumbai Port Authority gave a general donation of Rs. 10 Lakh to the Asiatic Society of Mumbai. The Society is thankful to the Chairman, Shri Rajiv Jalota (IAS) for this generous donation given at a time when the Society is facing financial difficulties.
- Dr. Parineeta Deshpande resigned as the Hon. Director of the Kane Institute and Prof. Suraj Pandit was appointed as the In-charge Director of the Kane Institute.
- The Asiatic Society of Mumbai received a donation from the Indian Heritage Society for the restoration of four portraits – Alexander Burnes, Daniel Ross, W.E. Frere, and Charles Malcolm, which were displayed in the Research room of the Society.
- Ronald Deniz, Senior Clerk has been appointed as the Chief Information Officer and Mr. Nitin Patil, Administrative Officer, as the Appellate Officer to answer the Right to Information (RTI) queries
- The Ministry of Culture, Government of India, organized a three-day International Museum Expo 2023 which was held from 18th – 20th May 2023 at Pragati Maidan, New Delhi under the aegis of Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav, the flagship programme to mark the 70th Anniversary of India's Independence. Additionally, this year's International Museum Day (IMD) theme according to the International Council of Museums (ICOM) was “Museums, Sustainability and Wellbeing” and this initiative was designed to Institute a holistic conservation around museums. Mr. Sunil Bhirud, Lab Supervisor, was invited by the Joint Secretary, Ministry of Culture, to participate in the International Museum Expo – 2023 in Delhi and he conducted a session on “Preventive Conservation of Rare Books” on 20th May 2023.
- The President, Prof. Vispi Balaporia, and Dr. Shehernaz Nalwalla, Vice President, were invited for a one-day blended National Conference on “New Perspective of the History of India: Socio-Cultural, Geo Political & Economic Aspects on 13th October 2023 at the B.K. Birla College of Arts, Commerce & Science, Kalyan. At the same conference, Mr. Sunil Bhirud, Lab Supervisor, made a presentation on Paper Conservation during a session on The Importance and Need to Preserve the Heritage of India. His focus was on the conservation efforts at the Asiatic Society of Mumbai.
- The Mumbai Research Centre of the Asiatic Society of Mumbai was invited by the Indian Navy to be a partner for the 2nd Edition of the Indian Navy Mumbai Heritage Run 2023. The aim of this 5 KM and 10 KM run open to the public was to promote heritage awareness of the City. The Society's Logo was displayed on their award ceremony podium.
- The Society commissioned Past Perfect to prepare an Annotated and Descriptive Catalogue of Maps in the Society's Collection. The catalogue is in progress as the team identified folded maps hitherto classified as books, which need to be incorporated in the catalogue.
- Two lectures on “Thinking Civilisation” by Dr. Ganesh Devy, Honorary Fellow of the Society, were held on 5th and 6th September 2023 in the Durbar Hall of the Society. The lectures were held to revisit the idea of civilisation as it emerged when the Asiatic Societies were founded, and presented new perspectives available to us towards re-conceptualising the idea of civilization.

'MAPPED! – SURVEYS THAT LEFT BEHIND A LEGACY', an Exhibition Showcasing a Selection of Rare Maps Curated from the Special Collections at the Asiatic Society of Mumbai

The maps chosen for display served as a testament to a revolution in 19th century India which saw one of the most advanced mapping exercises ever to take place in the history of the world - the Great

Trigonometrical Survey of India. The selection process was defined by two priorities - one was the need to succinctly communicate the method, story and scale of the GTS. The second was the inclusion of maps belonging to the Second Revenue Survey of Bombay, which was an extension of the GTS – which was imagined to serve as an anchor for locals to reorient themselves after processing the overwhelming created scale and complexity of the GTS.

- Additional Elements that enhanced the exhibition:
- **A Restored Portrait of Alexander Burnes**
 - **A Photo Carousel with Prints of 20 Archival Photographs and Objects that gave visitors a visual peek** into the Great Trigonometrical Survey of India
 - **Anecdote Cards**, placed in small, black acrylic boxes mounted on the sides of the map stands. These cards carried anecdotes and quotes from primary accounts that the curators came across during their research. Through this, the exhibition achieved its objective of foregrounding the lived experiences of surveyors and natives throughout the mammoth mapping exercise.
 - **A Digital Stopover**: An interactive, 65-inch digital screen most definitely enhanced visitor accessibility to maps that were otherwise not displayed at the exhibition and provided visitors of all ages with an elevated experience via this medium. Additionally, it also allowed the audience to engage deeply with the digital versions of the maps on display.

- Reading Corner: A reading corner stationed in the centre of the exhibition hall, envisioned to be a space for visitors to unwind, reflect and learn more about the subject, before, during or after going through the display of maps. The collection, borrowed from the Asiatic Library for the duration of the exhibition, consisted of 22 books predominantly written in English which were related to mapping, the GTS and the city of Mumbai and were available for all visitors to browse through.
- Selection of 7 Rare Books from the collection of the Asiatic Library: Alexander Burnes' Travels into Bokhara, Vol. I was displayed beside his restored portrait, while James Rennell's Memoir of a Map of Hindoostan accompanied his 1788 Map of Hindoostan or the Mogul Empire, offering insights into the map's creation. Additionally, five books related to the Great Trigonometrical Survey (GTS), showcasing formulae, calculations, trig station records, and surveyor notes, were displayed in acrylic cases. These provided a glimpse into the meticulous work behind the detailed maps produced during the GTS.
- Model of "The Great Theodolite" and a Mini Theodolite: A replica of the theodolite used by William Lambton and a mini theodolite dating back to the period of the British East India Company were loaned by the Department of Geology at St. Xavier's College, Mumbai for the duration of the exhibition. These instruments were placed on the table with the rare books and were highly appreciated by visitors as they provided a tangible reference to the GTS.
- A Short, 2.5. minute video of the Great Trigonometrical Survey, meant to be an introductory audio visual experience for all visitors in the exhibition hall, was played on loop throughout the exhibition.
- Souvenirs: A variety of souvenirs, including map postcards, mugs, etched glasses, diaries, tote bags, jigsaw puzzles, and prints of old Bombay maps were available for purchase. These items sold out quickly due to the high demand and quality. A small red letterbox allowed guests to write and send postcards to loved ones, with weekly collections sent to the GPO for mailing.

Several talks were held to add value to the exhibition:

- **13th May 2023** – Mapping India: Then & Now: A Public lecture by Dr. Manosi Lahiri, a professional geographer, IT entrepreneur, published author and founder of India's first GIS company
- **16th May 2023** – Survey of India and the Pundits: A Public talk by Riaz Dean, author of two non-fiction books - 'Mapping the Great Game' and 'The Stone Tower'.

Response: With an average footfall of close to 100 visitors a day, the exhibition attracted people from all over the country. The last week in fact saw close to 300 visitors a day with the last day touching the 1000 mark - a true achievement for an exhibition designed around a historical subject! The exhibition was frequented by architects, entrepreneurs, engineers, designers, historians, creative and cultural heritage professionals, journalists, map collectors, photographers, surveyors, geologists, enthusiasts of history, maps and geography, professors and students of geography, history, and architecture. This was accompanied by numerous mentions in the press and on social media.

Additionally, the Urban Heritage Committee of the Rotary Club Bombay Charities Trust No.3, adopted 9 books of the Great Trigonometric Survey for Rs.2 Lakh.

THE FESTIVAL OF LIBRARIES, PRAGATI MAIDAN, NEW DELHI

Impressed by the 'Mapped!' exhibition at The Asiatic Society of Mumbai in May 2023, Joint Secretary, Ministry of Culture, India, requested its inclusion in the Festival of Libraries, 2023. Recognizing its historical and cultural significance, her goal was to make the Society's exceptional collection of maps accessible to a broader public.

The 'Festival of Libraries 2023' was a two-day event held on the 5th and 6th of August 2023. The festival highlighted iconic libraries from India and across the world to initiate a conversation on globally renowned best practices in libraries and the modernization and digitization of libraries in India. The pavilion allotted to The Asiatic Society of Mumbai was one of 10 captivating exhibitions showcasing the evolution of cartography, private and public archives, calligraphy, and cursive writing styles in 22 vernacular languages from across India as well as tribal fonts through theme-based exhibitions.

The event was inaugurated and visited by esteemed dignitaries ranging from the President of India to various ministers from the Ministry of Culture and witnessed a large turnout of scholars, writers, librarians, private collectors, map enthusiasts, students, and the public.

The 'Mapped!' pavilion exhibited a curated selection of 10 maps, ranging from the early cartographic endeavours of European explorers, notably Italian, Dutch, and German in the 18th century, to the colonial-era maps produced by The Great Trigonometrical Survey of India in the 19th century. The arrangement of these maps followed a chronological sequence and the display was a fusion of two previous rare map exhibitions, held at The Asiatic Society of Mumbai in April 2022 and May 2023, with a few new additions that would make the display relatable for audiences in Delhi.

In addition to offering high-resolution reprints of the above-mentioned maps and carefully curated labels, the exhibition introduced a people-centred touch through anecdote cards, a captivating carousel of photo prints from The Great Trigonometrical Survey of India, and reprints of two rare volumes from The Asiatic Society of Mumbai's collection tied to the history of the GTS. The inclusion of an interactive digital screen, showcasing maps charting the Pundits' explorations, and a looping video narrating the exhibition's storyline, added a multimedia layer to the visitor experience.

The Delhi edition of 'Mapped!' also received overwhelming praise from general visitors, and scholars alike. As one of the only exhibitions that stood out in its design and storyline, 'Mapped!' was lauded as a unique and well-curated initiative that enriched public understanding of how cartographic knowledge of India evolved over time. Many enquired about the collections at the Asiatic Society of Mumbai and enthusiastically picked up brochures that gave them details about ASM, its collections and details about Granth Sanjeevani. Guests of honour, members of the Ministry of Culture and other exhibitors also greatly appreciated the display and admired the gems that were part of the Asiatic Society's collection.

Textile Manufacturers of India:

An exhibition on “The Textile Manufacturers of India” curated by Savitha Suri, Life Member of the Society, was held from 5th - 8th July 2023 in the Durbar Hall of the Society.

The Textile Manufactures of India by John Forbes Watson is a landmark piece of literature and textile history that changed the course of India's handcrafted textiles.

Compiled in 20 sets of 18 volumes each, the work contains an exhaustive collection of Indian handcrafted textiles that were traded and/or produced for domestic consumption.

ASM is in possession of all 18 volumes (across the 2 editions) as part of the Rare Archives and these were brought out for display in July 2023 for the first time ever.

The display had two objectives:

1. To put the spotlight on ASM's collection; the preservation and conservation of rare books and the 'Adopt a book' program
2. To shed light on the historical narrative that led to the decline of the Indian handloom sector.

The event included a curated display of the volumes and guided walk throughs. Vintage and contemporary textiles were on display to help visitors compare and understand the extent of loss of textile skill & heritage.

The event also focused on the need for updated, comprehensive research and documentation on India's textiles as well as enabling a better appreciation of its textile heritage among laypersons. The event had a very heavy footfall with visitors from different parts of the country that included textile experts, practitioners, artisans, researchers, academia, media and laypersons.

Some of the notable visitors included Shilpa Shah (TAPI), IMC-Ladies' Wing, Pradeep & Mala Sinha (Bodhi), Manish Saxena (Lead Advisor- Aadyam Handwoven by Aditya Birla), Curators from CSMVS and Sarmaya, members of the Crafts Council of Gujarat, Tinaz Nooshian (Chief Editor, Mid-day), Namrata Zakaria (Freelance Fashion Journalist) and educational institutions like NIFT, Whistling Woods, Wilson College and Xavier's College.

Peepul Tree did a short video on the event (available on their YouTube channel) and the collection, and it also received print media coverage in leading national dailies. The event led to other curations of the volumes for prestigious organisations like Sutr Santati, Selvdege (UK) and Tvam Foundation - all of whom are at the forefront of textile advocacy, research and documentation.

The curations have helped monetise - in a careful & responsible manner- the compendium and have increased awareness among researchers on resources that were not available until now. It has helped add new information that furthers research into certain textiles while opening new avenues in others. The event helped highlight the role of institutions like ASM in conserving knowledge and preserving rare & precious literary resources.

ARCHITECTS AND FIRMS THAT BUILT MODERN BOMBAY:

The “Architects and Firms That Built Modern Bombay” was a collaborative exhibition between Art Deco Trust, Mumbai, and the Mumbai Research Centre. The exhibition was supported by the Rotary Club of Bombay and was held in the Durbar Hall of the Society from 2nd March to 10 March 2024.

The exhibition honoured the architects and firms who built Bombay through the 1930s-50s, with a progressive vision for a modern way of life. Several of them were first generation of Indian architects, graduating from homegrown schools like Sir J. J. School of Art. Much of the built form of the city they

designed and envisioned still stands tall, and have provided Mumbaikars with a quality of life they have enjoyed for decades. Yet, they have never been identified or acknowledged for their singular contribution in shaping modern Bombay. This exhibition is a tribute to them. The exhibition provided an opportunity to see the material contributed by family members of these architects, such as plaques, rare original drawings, photographs and personal memorabilia hitherto unseen. Books relevant to the subject from the ASM collection were on display.

PARTICIPATION OF THE ASIATIC SOCIETY OF MUMBAI IN THE TATA MUMBAI MARATHON (TMM) 2024:

Tata Mumbai Marathon (TMM) has been a powerful platform for philanthropy. It brings together companies, NGOs and individuals who leverage this platform to spread awareness and raise funds. The Asiatic Society of Mumbai for the first time participated in the Tata Mumbai Marathon held on 21st January, 2024.

Thanks to the efforts of Mr. Rajan Jayakar, Chairperson, Events & Souvenir Committee; Ms. Pooja Mahurkar, Convenor, Events & Souvenir Committee; and office staff a long process of online form filling, the Asiatic Society page came alive on the Website of United Ways, Mumbai.

The Event & Souvenir Committee has successfully raised One lac forty-eight thousand and one hundred rupees through this route. The name of each donor is also displayed on our webpage <https://www.unitedwaymumbai.org/ngo-1569>. The sum was directly transferred to the Society's account without any deductions.

Other Efforts:

The Running team and the cheering team were dressed in specially designed T-shirts to exemplify the presence of Asiatic Society of Mumbai at the Tata Mumbai Marathon 2024 Race. The cost of the T-shirts was borne by the individuals. A retractable banner was also designed and printed for this purpose. This is a universal banner of the Asiatic Society of Mumbai and can be used as and when required.

Path for the future:

This was our first year of participation and we faced many hurdles. We carry many learnings for the next year. We hope that we can capitalise on all the routes for fundraising to raise a big corpus and large numbers in terms of 'on ground participants,' in various categories.

PIGMENT ANALYSIS OF MANUSCRIPTS

A project titled Mapping Color in History (MCH) for pigmentation was undertaken. The pigment analysis of five manuscripts in possession of the Asiatic Society of Mumbai was carried out under the aegis of the Lakshmi Mittal and Family South Asia Institute, Harvard, by Ms. Anjali Jain, MCH India Coordinator and Conservationist.

The five manuscripts analyzed were: Aranyakaparvan, Prajnaparamita, Kalpasutra 63-4, Kalpasutra 205-1, Gandavyuha, Karandavyuha.

The analysis was carried out on the premises of the Asiatic Society of Mumbai using the MCH mobile heritage lab equipment which was temporarily housed at the CSMVS and loaned to the Society.

An additional manuscript of the Shahnama was also analyzed at the Society's request.

A detailed report was submitted and corrective and conservation measures were suggested. The five manuscripts were further rehoused in acid free boxes made on the premises and Sameer Salvi, binder, was trained to carry out the housing of more manuscripts as and when required.

The Society was presented with a set of digital imaging data that was procured in the process of documenting the manuscripts.

Jinnah Kim, the Director and Principal Investigator, visited the ASM on 7th March 2024 and presented the Society with a copy of her book Garland of Visions: Color, Tantra and a Material History of Indian Painting

COLLABORATIVE TALKS:

The following two collaborative programmes were held with the Istituto Italiano di Cultura di Mumbai in the Durbar Hall of the Society:

- i. A collaborative talk was organised by the Asiatic Society of Mumbai and the Istituto Italiano di Cultura di Mumbai on "Buddhist Art in Maharashtra and its maritime connections" by Dr. Pia Brancaccio. The talk was held on 2nd September 2023. The talk chaired by Prof. Suraj Pandit was well attended.
- ii. The Asiatic Society of Mumbai and the Istituto Italiano di Cultura di Mumbai held a collaborative book presentation and lecture titled "Tibet and the Indian Subcontinent in the Eyes of a 20th-century Italian Scholar" by Prof. Giacolella Orofino, University of Naples "L'Orientale" on 22nd February 2024 in the Durbar Hall of the Society. On this occasion, a book "Giuseppe Tucci: A biography" by Alice Crisanti, was presented.

Mahanagar Gas Limited (MGL) project:

This was the first CSR Project offered to the Society. Although the period of negotiations covered several months and the Trustees had been informed, the Managing Committee had not been taken on board. Eventually, an MOU was signed to refurbish the main Library Hall and to convert the Research Room into a meeting hall at a cost of Rs. 1.6 crore. This, too, had not been approved by the Managing Committee. A restoration project prepared earlier by Ms. Sheetal Gandhi (Conservation Architect) had been used for the MOU

The architect had drawn it up earlier for the ASM for attracting potential donors. However, the proposed shifting of thousands of books received adverse media coverage at a time when a new Managing Committee had just been elected. The Hon. Secretary had also recorded her opposition to the shifting of books. The Managing Committee then requested one of its members to devise proper protocols for the shift, storage and safe return of the books. His initial enquiries showed major flaws:

- (a) the said project worth Rs. 1.6 Crores was a cosmetic project, wrongly labelled as renovation and restoration project;
- (b) a project of Rs 1.6 Crores had been awarded to a single vendor without any attempts made at getting competing bids or alternative proposals;
- (c) the project details had not been approved by the Managing Committee;
- (d) also, the CSR project did not seem to match ASM's far more pressing and critically important demands for renovation and restoration.

When the above facts, and many more details, were presented before the Managing Committee; the Managing Committee put immediate brakes on the project and immediately constituted a larger Kick-Start Committee. It was tasked with –

- (a) keeping MGL abreast of these findings, and
- (b) exploring whether in the short time available before year-end any alternate viable proposal, approved after due process, would be acceptable to MGL.

On explaining facts to MGL, MGL officials expressed their gratitude to the Kick-Start Committee for having saved both institutions from a potentially deleterious situation. However, since the revised project needed fresh approvals, MGL officials advised that it would be better to make fresh bids in the new financial year.

We would like to place on record our appreciation of the Public Works Department (PWD) Officials who have helped us throughout the year. The Officials of the PWD have given us their full support for the repairs and maintenance of the Society. The PWD has helped us to organise the function held to celebrate our Foundation Day on 25th November 2023, when the Chief Guest, His Excellency, Shri Ramesh Bais, Chief Patron of the Society and Hon'ble Governor of Maharashtra was present.

3. THE SOCIETY REGRETS THE SAD DEMISE OF THE FOLLOWING MEMBERS / STAFF:

Ek Nath A Kshirsagar:

It is with deep regret that we announce the sad demise of our Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Mr. Ek Nath Atmaram Kshirsagar, who passed away on 11th November 2023. Mr. Kshirsagar made a long and productive set of contributions to the Asiatic Society for over two decades. He was Vice President for many years, working with the President, Mr. B G Deshmukh. In particular he took charge of the Bicentennial celebrations which were highly successful. He cared deeply about building the institutional strength of the Asiatic Society, including through engaging with professionals to help in modernising our accounting systems and management processes. He was an engaged participant in our various lectures and activities. He was also a thoughtful and wise Chairman, guiding us through challenging times during Covid and beyond. We sincerely appreciate his commitment and service and are grateful for his leadership. We extend our deepest condolences to his wife and family.

Virchand Dharamsey:

The Asiatic Society of Mumbai condoles the death of Mr. Virchand Dharamsey, noted film studies scholar and historian. Mr. Dharamsey, who passed away on 6th April 2023, was a member of the Society from 1966. He was a constant presence in the library of the Society for many decades, and could be spotted poring over voluminous files of old newspapers or identifying rare manuscripts and printed books. In 2012, the Asiatic Society awarded Mr. Dharamsey its Silver Medal for his book, Bhagwanlal Indraji, the First Indian Archaeologist: Multidisciplinary Approaches to the Study of the Past. Mr. Dharamsey was considered the leading authority on the silent era of Indian films; not only did he publish extensively on this subject, but he advised two generations of researchers on the arcane aspects of Indian films. He was deeply interested in a wide variety of subjects besides film history and archaeology. In 2023, the Society

had published “AVANAV – A Collection of Virchand Dharamsey's essays in Gujarati, edited by Dr. Hemant Dave. Mr. Dharamsey was also concerned about the administration of the Society's affairs and was a member of its Managing Committee from 2005–2008. He was the Joint Honorary Secretary of the Society for two years (2006–2008) and briefly officiated as its Honorary Secretary. He was also elected as a Vice- President of the Society from 2009–2011. His quiet presence is deeply missed.

Dr Vijaya Gupchup

Dr. Vijaya Gupchup passed away on 15th April 2023. She was an active member of the Asiatic Society of Mumbai for several years. Vijaya Gupchup was an educator and historian, associated with premier institutions in Mumbai. Her interests primarily lay in research and she has written books for children and also authored many books on the history of Mumbai. Special mention may be made of her book “Dr. George Birdwood – The Promoter of Goodwill Between the East and West” and her well researched and insightful book “Arthur Travers Crawford: A Riddle Wrapped Up in an Enigma.” Vijaya Gupchup was a member of the Modern Book Selection Committee for several years. She has made a rich contribution to the Society. We will miss her deeply.

Dr. Geeta Ramana

Dr. Geeta Ramana was a Life Member of the Society from 01-04-1989. After a long illness fought bravely, she passed away on 7th April 2023. She was a Professor of Philosophy at the Department of Philosophy, University of Mumbai, and at the Asiatic Society of Mumbai she served as a member of the Modern Book Selection Committee of the Society for many years.

Dr Uma Sheth:

Dr Uma Sheth passed away on 17th October 2023. Dr Uma Sheth had a very long association with the Asiatic Society of Mumbai and participated enthusiastically in many of its activities. She was on the Managing Committee of the Society for some years. She unfailingly accompanied her husband, Dr Kirti Sheth, every year to the Bansari Sheth Memorial Lecture.

Prof. B.N. Goswami:

Prof. B.N. Goswami, who passed away on 17th November 2023, was conferred the Honorary Fellowship of the Society in 2010. Prof Goswami was a national icon, a scholar par excellence, and an inspiration for young generations of art lovers, students, and museum professionals. His passing is a shared loss for the country.

Prof. Suma Chitnis:

Prof Suma Chitnis, who passed away in February 2024, was a pillar of strength to this Institution, of which she was a member for many years, and later a Trustee from 2011-2020. Her erudition, her understanding of issues associated with learned institutions and people was immense; her advice and guidance were always highly appreciated. The Society will miss her deeply.

Joint Condolence meeting for late Mr. S.G. Kale at Y B Chavan Centre

Several organisations and institutions with which late Mr. S.G. Kale was associated were represented at the condolence meeting held at the Y B Chavan Centre. The President, Prof. Vispi Balaporia, spoke on behalf of the Society, highlighting Mr. Kale's positive contributions during his long association with the Society, adhering to his high standards of dedication and integrity. The Society had also held a Condolence meeting at the Durbar Hall of the Society on 6th April 2023.

Joint Condolence meeting for late Mr. Eknath Kshirsagar at the CSMVS Museum:

The Society suffered an irreparable loss with the passing of Mr. Eknath Kshirsagar, Chairperson of the Board of Trustees, after several months of ill-health.

The Society held a condolence meeting on 23rd November 2023 in its Durbar Hall. Since Mr. Kshirsagar was also the Chairman of the Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj Vastu Sangrahalaya (CSMVS, Mumbai), a joint condolence meeting was held on 20th November 2023 on the Heritage Lawns of the Museum. The President, Prof. Vispi Balaporia, gave a condolence speech on behalf of the Asiatic Society.

4. PROJECTS UNDERTAKEN THROUGH THE GRANT

The Society has undertaken projects from the Planned Grant-in-aid received from the Ministry of Culture, Government of India, New Delhi. The details of the on-going projects which are in the process of completion are given below:

On-going projects undertaken from the Planned Grant-in-aid of the Ministry of Culture

i) Critical Edition and Translation of Manuscripts in the Holdings of the Asiatic Society of Mumbai, 2008.

Study of Manuscripts on the possession of Asiatic Society of Mumbai. The project funded by the Ministry of Culture was initiated to study various manuscripts in the possession of Asiatic Society of Mumbai, under the leadership of Dr. A. P. Jamkhedkar in 2008 and it commenced in the same year. Following titles are taken up for the study:

Verula Mahatmya has been published. The final report on the Sukruta Sagara and Swayambhu Purana was submitted to Asiatic Society of Mumbai. Amaligrama Mahatmya has been completed and is in the press. Critical text of Purvardha and Uttarardha are being prepared.

ii) Handbook of Coins in the holdings of the Asiatic Society of Mumbai (2009-2010):

As required by Dr. Shailendra Bhandare, the Society assigned the task of photographing the coins to Mr. Soumitra Pendse, a professional photographer. He took high resolution photographs of the Gold Coins which have been forwarded to Dr Bhandare, who is in the process of completing the Handbook.

The stock-taking of books and periodicals could not be carried out during the financial year 2023-24 due to the staff being deployed in the Book Selection Committee and Periodical Committee to complete the processing of newly purchased books. The sterling achievement is that deep cleaning has been completed in May 2023 which started in the last financial year 2022-23 from 27th February 2023 to 6th May 2023. This involved cleaning of the Library area and the upper basements.

5.4 Staff Placement Committee:

The Managing Committee decided to constitute a Staff Placement Committee which included two staff representatives to look into the pay related grievances of the staff. This Committee led by Prof. Usha R Vijailakshmi commenced work in June 2023. It went through the files of every member of the staff and prepared a master file where all service-related details were entered. From July last year each staff member was called as per their availability and the information entered was verified and they were asked to confirm that it was correct. The staff members were then asked to write down their grievances which are kept in an office file. This information is being collated and will be circulated to the Members of the Staff Placement Committee with suggestions to find a way forward.

5.5 Library Digitization Project - Phase II:

The Library Digitization Project – Phase II is being carried out at the Asiatic Society of Mumbai through a generous grant of Rs.5 Crore from the Higher & Technical Education Department, Government of Maharashtra.

The Library Digitization Project is an ongoing project, now in its third year of Phase II. Rare books, manuscripts, newspapers, maps, journals, and government publications are duly digitized and uploaded on the ASM Web Portal.

Plans are underway to add the postcards collections donated by Mr. Mukund Nawathe on the Web Portal. The Asiatic Society of Mumbai has received Rs.1 Crore from the Government of Maharashtra for the Project's Phase II.

During this period a total of 304 people (including 2 institutions) subscribed to our Web Portal Granth Sanjeevani. The Government of Maharashtra aided public libraries were given free access to Granth Sanjeevani.

Microfilming / Digitization, Manuscripts, Rare Books and Maps Section:

During the year 9,401 books were digitized and 29 microfilm rolls of Indian Spectator (1883 to 1901) and 18 rolls of Native Opinion (1867 to 1889) were scanned under the Library Digitization Project. Further 7,050 books were checked for quality.

4,725 Microfilm rolls were rechecked and cleaned.

121 Researchers / Scholars referred to the digitized / microfilmed material from the Special Collection Room for their research purpose. The Microfilming / Digitization Department had given 2,114 printouts / microfilm printouts / soft copies to researchers (Members / Non-Members) on payment

5.6 Publications Committee Report:

The Publication Committee of the Asiatic Society of Mumbai completed a long-awaited project this year. Some years ago, a project of the compilation of some important articles of Mr. Virchand Dharamsey was undertaken. This project was delayed due to unavailability of the material and copyright of some rare photos. Finally, after completion of all the formalities, the book- 'Avanav'—was released on 31st March 2023.

The book release function was well attended. Mr. Atul Dodiya, the renowned artist released the book 'Avanav'. Dr. Hemant Dave, the editor of the book, was interviewed by Mr. Murali R. Sadly, the release function, in a way, became a condolence meeting as just a week before the release function, unexpectedly, Virchand Dharamsey passed away on 6th April 2023. The Asiatic Society paid a befitting tribute to the Silver Medalist of the Asiatic Society, an archaeologist, a film historian and a film critic by releasing his book.

Rare memories of him were shared by his friends like Amrit Ganger-the film historian, Mr Prabodh Parikh the renowned poet, and family members of the late Mr. Dharamsey.

The Publications Committee held one meeting during the year.

5.7 Dr. Aroon Tikekar Centre for Advanced Studies:
Chairperson: Mr. Vilas Dhavale
Convenor: Ms. Smruti Koppikar

This Centre was set up in 2016-17 and has the following to its credit so far:

- a) the annual fellowship has yielded research work of six Tikekar Fellows, while the dissertation of the seventh candidate is expected by August 2024,
- b) noteworthy scholars and professionals have delivered the annual Tikekar Lecture on Feb 1st every year,
- c) a continuing series of lectures in nearly a dozen colleges in Mumbai and the larger Mumbai Metropolitan Region on history, environment, food have been held to engage the younger generation.

The Tikekar Fellowship for 2023-24 was awarded, with Rs.1.25 lakhs each, by consensus of the sub-committee, to two researchers Mr Pankaj Bhosale and Dr Himanshu Smart, to explore issues related to language and literature in the Marathi literary and theatre world. Mr. Smart submitted his dissertation titled “Metropolitan, half-metropolitan and new metropolitan sensibilities reflected in Marathi dramas of the last three decades”. Mr. Bhosale has sought an extension till August 2024 for submission of his work due to his illness; the committee granted him the extension after due deliberations and after seeking a joint review with his mentor and a jury member.

The annual function of the Tikekar Centre was held in the Durbar Hall on 1 February 2024. Reputed writer, translator, chronicler of theatre and an engaged observer of the arts and culture, Ms. Shanta Gokhale, was the chief guest. She spoke on “The Great Language Divide” across the demographics and politics of language in plays and literature in Mumbai. Its success and appreciation were reflected in the numerous questions asked by the audience.

On the day, as has become the tradition now, the current Fellow Dr. Himanshu Smart presented a synopsis of his completed Fellowship work and Mr. Aslam Saiyad was announced as the selected candidate to pursue the Tikekar Fellowship for 2024-25. He presented the plan for carrying out the work for his subject titled “Cultural & Religious Festivals of Adivasis of Palghar District through sociological and economic lenses”.

The Centre launched the new Tikekar Memorial Lecture series in 2023-24 to deliberate about Mumbai and its future. The second in this series was held on December 1, 2023, at the Durbar Hall and was delivered by the noted Economist, and the Vice Chancellor of The Gokhale Institute of Politics & Economics, Dr. Ajit Ranade, who spoke on the topic “Who moved Mumbai’s Economy? Its dynamic evolution and prospects.” Prof Abhay Pethe, Advisor to The Gokhale Institute of Politics & Economics, responded to the lecture.

The purpose of this series is to bring ideas from professionals and others in housing, transport, economy, ecology, employment-jobs, culture and more to the table and have other eminent people in the field respond to those ideas, all of which we hope to bring together in a volume that will provide a way forward for the city/region from the crossroads it is at.

The college lecture series held in colleges across Mumbai and Mumbai Metropolitan Region continued this year too. This year’s series continued with the same subject as the last year, titled “The Logy of Mumbai” which took the young audiences across history, archaeology, biology, culinary arts and more, developed and ably delivered by Dr Kurush Dalal. All the lectures were well received. The four colleges covered were Sophia College (Bhulabhai Desai Road), Wilson College (Chowpatty), Patkar College (Goregaon) and Birla College (Kalyan).

Dr Aroon Tikekar Centre hopes to continue the research and knowledge dissemination work it has done so far, and augment it in other ways in the coming years.

6. MM Dr. P.V. Kane Institute for Post-Graduate Studies and Research

Prof. Dr. Suraj A. Pandit was appointed the In-charge Director of the MM Dr. P.V. Kane Institute for Post-Graduate Studies and Research after Dr. Parineeta Deshpande's resignation. Mr. Sudhir Dongare and Mr. Pravin Garud are two prospective PhD students in the subject of History under the able guidance of Dr. Abhidha Dhumatkar. They submitted their proposal for topic approval to the University of Mumbai this year and are enrolled for the PhD degree with the Institute. Another candidate, Mr. Prashant Gharat, has enrolled himself at the Kane Institute in the subject of Ancient Indian Culture. His research proposal is under preparation under the guidance of Prof. Dr. Suraj A. Pandit. Dr. Rupali Mokashi had asked for a No Objection Certificate to enrol students in the Subject of Ancient Indian Culture, if the University grants her recognition to guide students for the PhD degree. This has been issued in consultation with the office bearers of the Asiatic Society of Mumbai.

8. RESEARCH, SCHOLARSHIP & MEDALS COMMITTEE:

Chairperson: Prof. Usha R Vijailakshmi

Convenor: Dr. Kunda Pramila Nilakanth

From April 2023 to March 2024 a total of 9 meetings was held. Five out of seven members regularly attended the meetings.

Important steps taken by the committee to improve quality of research:

1. The Committee felt the need to introduce guidelines to researchers and the reviewers to maintain research standards, to follow research ethics and to observe uniformity in submissions. After detailed discussions in the subsequent meetings Prof. Usha R Vijailakshmi drafted the Guidelines for researchers, the reviewers, and the format of self-declaration to be provided by the researchers during the final submission.
2. Dr. Kunda P.N. drafted the submission guidelines for the researchers. After extensive discussions these were approved by the Committee and the Managing Committee.
3. The Committee made it mandatory for the researchers to complete a two-day research methodology course once selected for the scholarship.
4. The eligibility criteria for research scholars were revised.
 - (a) Qualification for the scholars should be minimum post-graduation and candidate should have registered for Ph.D.
 - (b) For two scholarships related to professional fields the candidate should have either a PhD registration or have acquired a minimum of five years' experience in the related field.
 - (c) The candidate should not have received any other scholarship from ASM in the previous 5 years.
5. To increase the grant amounts, which are meagre, the Committee decided to combine the years of some of the scholarships. This was to be implemented by the Committee from 2024-25.
6. Interviews were held for selection of candidates for various scholarships for the year 2023-24. The applicants were given suggestions and were asked to revise their proposal. Based on the final proposal three candidates were selected for various scholarship programmes.
7. The Committee conducted a six-monthly viva voce for the recipients of the 2022-23 scholarships. The Convener compiled the suggestions given by the members and sent those to the recipients for incorporation.
8. The Committee asked the Convener to write to the candidates who had not submitted their dissertations due to covid pandemic. Individually, the members called up the scholarship awardees asking them to complete the projects.
9. Due to collective efforts, not only the candidates of 2022-23, but those who were awarded scholarships previously submitted their dissertations. These were sent to reviewers and their suggestions were mailed to the recipients for appropriate revision. Once the changes were made, they were asked to submit a hard copy and thereafter the final installment of the grant was dispersed to them. Similarly, an honorarium of Rs. 1,000/- was paid and thank you letters were sent to the reviewers for their work.

10. TAGORE FELLOWSHIP / SCHOLARSHIP:

Under the Scheme for Tagore National Fellowship for Cultural Research (TNFCR) for the batch 2020-2021 and 2021-2022, the Society had received 5 applications. In keeping with the rules pertaining to the award of the Tagore Fellowship / Scholarship, the Institutional Search-cum-Screening Committee (ILSSC) comprising of Vice Presidents of the Society, Dr. Shehernaz Nalwalla and Prof. Usha R. Vijailakshmi, met on Friday, 1st December 2023 to scrutinize the applications received and to decide on the merit of each for forwarding to the Ministry of Culture, New Delhi. After carefully scrutinizing the 5 applications (3 applications for Tagore National Fellowship and 2 applications for Tagore Research Scholarship) received, the ILSSC Committee members came to the unanimous decision that the Committee did not approve the 5 proposals as they did not fit the criteria of Clause No. 5, Guidelines of the Tagore National Fellowship Scheme.

A meeting of the National Selection Committee of the Tagore National Fellowship for Cultural Research, Ministry of Culture, Government of India, was held at the Nehru Memorial Museum and Library on 11th March 2024. This meeting was attended by Dr Shehernaz Nalwalla, Vice President of the Society.

16. BINDERY SECTION

During the year under review, 1,761 books were fully bound in this section. This was apart from the routine work of stitching and pinning 3,982 newspapers, made 45 boxes, repairing books and files, pasting, packing, and parcelling.

The department also made storage Archival boxes for storing the valuable manuscripts under the guidance of Ms. Anjali Jain.

17. FINANCES

The Asiatic Society of Mumbai was established on 26th November 1804, by Sir James Mackintosh for the promotion of higher education and research. The Society has been partly funded by the Government of India, Ministry of Culture, Government of Maharashtra, Department of Higher and Technical Education, and Municipal Corporation of Greater Mumbai. The Society's own sources of income are interest and dividends from Corpus and Reserve Fund investments, general donations, earmarked donations, membership subscriptions, fines on books and periodicals, income from miscellaneous items like sale of publications, journals, souvenirs, etc. However, the financial position of the Society is quite precarious due to limited sources of income, decline in interest rates, and increasing recurring expenditure.

The Society has approached Government of India, Ministry of Culture for a one-time Corpus Grant of Rs.30 Crore (out of which we have received Rs.5 Crore) and Government of Maharashtra, Department of Higher and Technical Education for a one-time Corpus grant of Rs.20 Crore, as recommended by the Review Committee, appointed by the Ministry of Culture, Government of India. However, a positive response is awaited.

During the year, the Society succeeded in getting sanctioned an annual recurring grant of Rs.1 Crore from Government of Maharashtra, Department of Higher and Technical Education which was received on 5th January 2024.

The Society has also requested both the Central and the State Government to increase its Grant by Rs.1 Crore to run the Society efficiently.

The BMC has also been requested to enhance its maintenance Grant to Rs.2 Crore.

The Review Committee appointed by the Ministry of Culture, Government of India, has noted the historic significance of the Society and stated that the Asiatic Society of Mumbai deserves to be designated as an "Institutional of National Importance", while ensuring its autonomy over planning and financing of expenditure and management. The Society is following up this issue with the Ministry of Culture.

The Society is intensifying its efforts for donations from philanthropists, corporate houses, endowments, CSR funds, etc. for overall maintenance and development of the Society.

18. ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

We appreciate the financial assistance received from the Ministry of Culture, New Delhi, in the form of an annual grant of Rs one crore. Moreover, we are grateful to Ms Mughda Sinha, Jt. Secretary, for the interest she has shown in the Asiatic Society, and for her visits whenever she is in Mumbai.

We thank Mr. Govind Mohan, Secretary, Ministry of Culture, for his continuing interest in the welfare of the Society.

The Hon'ble Governor of Maharashtra and Chief Patron of the Society, Shri Bhagat Singh Koshiyari and Shri Ramesh Bais, for support and financial assistance to the Asiatic Society of Mumbai.

We are thankful to the Government of Maharashtra for acceding to our appeal for financial aid in managing the affairs of the Society, and for agreeing to a recurring annual grant of Rupees One crore from the financial year 2023-2024.

We are deeply obliged to the BMC for acceding to our request and sanctioning a grant of Rupees 50 Lakh to the Society.

The Rotary Club of Bombay for assisting the Society in various activities and, more specifically, for initiating the Maps exhibition and continued support.
